



Glacier Camp Health Protocols Summer 2020

Defining Authority: Anna Baxter, MPH -- Lake County Environmental Health Department. In any area where there is a question, or where different protocols offer conflicting guidance, Anna -- as the immediate civil health authority in Lake County -- will be our definitive resource.

Pre-Arrival Screening:

All staff and campers will be asked to do a pre-arrival screening, with instructions not come if manifesting any of the following symptoms:

- Fever (100.4° F/37.8° C or greater)
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Sore throat
- New loss of taste or smell
- Chills
- Head or muscle aches Nausea, diarrhea, vomiting

Staff and campers will also not be admitted to camp if they have had any exposure to anyone manifesting the above symptoms or have been in physical proximity to anyone who has tested positive for the COVID19 virus.

Screening Upon Arrival:

All campers and staff members will be screened upon arrival, using the appropriate screening form. Those who affirmatively answer any questions relating to possible COVID19 symptoms will not be admitted to camp.

Besides the screening form, all campers and staff will have their temperature taken and recorded. Indications of a fever (temperature of 100.4° F/37.8° C or greater) will result in denial of admission to camp.

Regular Screening:

Campers and staff will be screened for the above symptoms daily, including a daily temperature scan. If any of the symptoms present themselves, that staff member/camper will be isolated and if symptoms persist beyond 24 hours, they shall be sent home.

Food Service Practices:

Food service practices will conform to guidance provided by the Lake County Environmental Health Department. This guidance includes:

- No Self-Serve Buffets
- No More Than Eight Persons Per Table
- Adequate Space Between Tables to Maintain Social Distancing
- Cleansing/Disinfecting Tables Following Meals

Glacier Camp plans to employ two means of serving food:

- Family Style: Portions are brought to each table, with all leftovers discarded.
- Line Service: Guests will go through a line, socially distanced from each other and the food servers -- indicating which items and what quantities of each portion they would like. The plates and food will be handled by gloved servers before being presented to each guest at the line's end.

Facility Cleansing:

Facility cleansing shall be done in accordance to Lake County Environmental Health Department guidelines. This includes daily cleansing/sanitizing tables in the dining hall and all public areas. Public bathrooms shall be cleansed, sanitized, and disinfected at least once a day.
